Course: TOPICS SPECIFIC TO THE CORE FIELD OF RESEARCH - DISCIPLINE SPECIFIC Course Code: PHLAW - 104 Credits-04

This course constitutes the Subject Specific Paper which focuses on the specific area of research. A subject specific syllabus and title for the Course is to be framed by the Supervisor and approved by the Research Committee of the Department. The research student required to prepare a compilation of 2,000 pages of core literature relating to his/her research topic to go in a focused direction. The Research Supervisor will supervise the conduct of two seminars each of which will be preceded by the submission of a report by the student. There shall be an end course examination for the student.

The distribution of marks for the course is as follows:

Seminars on the topic of research – 20 marks.

Compilation of 2,000 pages of core literature relating to research topic - 10 Marks

Techniques of paper publication as evidenced in the submitted reports – 10 marks.

End course examination – 60 marks.
