Approaches to Social Science Research: Quantitative, Qualitative and Integrated. Basic Elements of Social Science Research: concepts, constructs, variables, theories and hypothesis. cause and

effect relationship. **Theory Construction** - Meaning, Inductive and Deductive Methods. **Philosophical base of research** - Ontological, Epistemological, Social reconstruction etc. **Social Science Research Designs**; Survey Research Designs; Exploratory, Descriptive and Explanatory. **Experimental Research Designs**; Pre-Experiment, True-Experiment and Quasi-Experiment.
