1.4.2 – How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

#### Feedback Obtained

Central University of Karnataka (CUK) is in Kalaburagi district situated in Northern Karnataka. The CUK offers various UG, PG and Ph.D. courses like B.A., B.Sc., MA, MSc, Ph.D. Presently over 1600 students are studying in CUK. The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) of the university has continuously been working on quality improvement and the betterment of the student learning experience. In order to analyse the lag areas of the university and the scope for further improvement, feedback from students, teachers, employers, and alumni have been collected. This report focuses on the feedback of students on the syllabus, Teaching and Monitoring process. Feedback was collected from students and alumni while revising the syllabus, and accordingly, syllabus revision was done based on feedback. Faculty and administration understand the areas where development is required and accordingly adopt the changes in the system. The methods in pedagogy were improved for the enhancement of supporting facilities in the departments. Infrastructural expansion is being done. Remedial coaching classes are organized for slow learners. More reference books are added to the Library.

Yes, CUK have adopted student mentoring system, where faculty members provide separate slots for meeting the students and discussing and guiding for their improvement. All the students in the department have access to the mentor at the scheduled time. As mentoring is an essential part of Curriculum, it is done regularly by the faculty members, where each faculty is assigned to mentor a specified number of students. Mentors create an open environment to talk and encourage students to express their difficulties and identify their problems, needs, skills, potential, interest. So as to guide and motivate them accordingly. Each class of students was assigned a teacher for mentoring. The mentoring program was primarily focussed on slow-learners. One-on-One mentoring of such students was taken-up as after-class interactions and by supplying valuable learning materials.

In 1999, UNESCO General Conference approved February 21 as International Mother Language Day and the same has been observed throughout the world since 2000. UNESCO mentions that multilingual and multicultural societies exist through their languages which transmit and preserve traditional knowledge and cultures in a sustainable way. Linguistics as a field plays a major role in preserving the language which is part of a community's culture. Keeping this in mind, the Department of Linguistics celebrated International Mother Language Day on 21st

February to spread the importance of language and how to preserve it from its extinct. 2. The centre following the opinion of the advisory committee published two important books: 1) A Hand book of Kannada Prosody The Ocean of Prosody 3. The Department of Foreign Languages Studies aspires to develop as a leading centre of studies and research in the field of languages it offers.

This vision gains special pertinence given the location of the Central University of Karnataka, Kalaburagi (Gulbarga) as after the EFLU, Hyderabad it will be the second university in South India offering full-time PhD programme in Arabic and Spanish.
